

COVID 19 - Funding and Grants

Thanks to all staff at DDCVS for providing copy as well as the hard work of other VCS organisations where many of the grants have previously been publicized - including Links CVS, Erewash Voluntary Action, Active Derbyshire and Support Staffordshire.

The Derbyshire Environmental Trust (DET) is again repeating its funding scheme in 2020/21. The Trust has yet to confirm the amount available for distribution but this is not expected to exceed £40,000. In view of the Coronavirus pandemic there is a preference for awarding a larger number of small to medium sized grants, thereby benefitting a greater number of organisations, rather than one or two larger projects.

School related projects, car parks, allotments, purchase of vehicles and footpaths adjacent to roads are not eligible. Submitted projects must be eligible under the rules of the Landfill Communities Fund – see www.entrust.org.uk or contact the DET office for details. Capital items only (no revenue funding). All applicants are encouraged to check the eligibility of their proposed project with the Trust before submitting an application. Minimum grant request of £2,500, maximum of £15,000.

Closing date for applications is 28 September 2020. Projects do not have to have match funding and there is no upper limit on the total project cost, however where applications require match funding this must be in place / confirmed no later than 27 November 2020.

The Social Enterprise Support Fund has launched today, providing grants of between £10,000 and £300,000 to help social enterprises during COVID-19.

The Social Enterprise Support Fund is aimed at social enterprises supporting people at high health risk from COVID-19, and those supporting people facing increased social and economic challenges as a result of COVID-19. <https://socialenterprisesupportfund.org.uk/>

The Steel Charitable Trust

Grants are made primarily to registered charities in the UK within the following funding areas:

- Arts and Culture
- Education
- Environment
- Disadvantaged
- Health

Please note that the Trust does not fund individuals or expeditions.

The total level of grants is expected to be £1,000,000 per annum of which approximately 30% will be made to organisations in the Luton and Bedfordshire area. Grants are generally made as single payments between £2,500 and £25,000.

The Trust receives many more applications than it has funds to support. Prospective applicants should be aware that less than 12% of the applications received are successful. In many cases it may not be possible even to make grants for projects within the funding priorities.

The Trustees generally meet in February, May, August and November. At these meetings, having reviewed all applications received in the previous three months, the Trustees approve the grants to be made to the successful applicants. All successful applicants will be notified by email and will be required to provide written confirmation of the details of the project or work for which they are seeking a grant.

Fashion and Textile Children's Trust

The Fashion and Textile Children's Trust is offering grants to parents and carers who have worked in the UK fashion or textile industry; and whose household income has reduced as a result of the coronavirus outbreak. Grants can be used to fund items for children such as clothing, bedding and essential household items such as white goods or specialist items for children with additional needs. However, grants to pay household bills or food costs, or grants to replace lost income, will not be made.

To apply for a grant, one parent or carer must have worked in the UK fashion and textile industry for at least one year within the last nine years. Jointly funded by the Education & Skills Funding Agency and the European Social Fund, Community Grants give charities and community organisations with a turnover of less than £500,000 an opportunity to access funds to deliver projects that help engage and progress 'hard to reach' individuals towards the labour market. The grants will support participants' progression so that they are confident in their ability to move into employment.

Stop Loan Sharks Community Fund - Deadline: 31st August 2020

The England Illegal Money Lending Team is accepting applications from local charities, voluntary organisations and community groups to support projects that raise awareness of the issues of the

dangers of illegal money lending in their community. Groups can apply for grants of up to £5,000 for projects that demonstrate a positive impact on their community and that meet the following criteria:

- Contributes to raising awareness of the dangers of using loan sharks.
- Prevents crime and disorder and makes a difference in local communities.
- Promotes the work of the Illegal Money Lending Team (IMLT) in communities.
- Encourages reporting of loan sharks and signposts victims to the team.

The Five Ways to Wellbeing are a set of national evidence-based actions (developed by the New Economics Foundation) which promote people's wellbeing. They are Connect, Be Active, Take Notice, Keep Learning and Give. These activities are simple things that individuals can do in their everyday lives which have been proven to help improve people's mental wellbeing.

So if your group or organisation helps people at higher risk of mental ill health meet one of more of the following 'Five Ways to Wellbeing' then you may consider applying for a grant:

You do not have to meet all five, but you do need to meet AT LEAST one of the Five Ways to Wellbeing. These are Connect; Be Active; Give; Take Notice; Keep Learning.

Where possible, design your project / activity to include all 5 elements of the Five Ways to Wellbeing. For example a 'walking group' could include all elements of the Five Ways in the following ways:

- Connect - ensuring the group is inclusive and has social elements like coffee breaks.
- Be Active – different levels of walks depending on ability i.e. beginners or advanced.
- Take Notice – themed walks such as nature trails and photography walks.
- Keep Learning – heritage trails, walk leader course.
- Give – providing support, advice, and encouragement to other members of the group

Children in Need's COVID-19 Next Steps Grant

The BBC Children in Need's COVID-19 Next Steps Grant programme opened for applications yesterday, Wednesday 10 June. Next Steps grants deliver support for children and young people affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Eligible organisations can apply for grants of up to £80,000 of flexible funding for projects starting in September 2020 and lasting for up to 18 months. Applicants must be available to discuss and review their proposal with a BBC Children in Need assessor between 13 and 31 July.

Applications to the Hardship Fund will be by **referral** (see below for the list of referral organisations) and individuals will need to meet the **criteria** to qualify.

The fund will provide **regular food parcels** and assistance with some critical **household expenses**. People will also be able to **access information on other support** available to them relative to their specific needs.

Food Charities

If you run a front-line food aid charity in England, you can apply for a grant of up to £100,000 to help you continue to provide food to the vulnerable. The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) will assess applications to the fund in the order they are submitted.

Government unlocks £150 million from dormant accounts

Culture Secretary Oliver Dowden announced that £150m will be released from dormant bank and building society account funds and made available to the voluntary sector in the following ways:

- £10m to the Youth Futures Foundation to develop an Emergency Levelling Up Youth Fund
- £45m to be issued by Big Society Capital to help investments and as emergency loans for those with cash flow issues
- £65m to Fair4AllFinance to provide 'affordable credit' solutions and as an alternative to high cost loans
- £30m to Access - the Foundation for Social Investment to support social enterprises helping people in vulnerable circumstances. The words 'social lenders' and 'flexible finance' are used.

Youth Futures Foundation

Funding to help young people aged 14-24 overcome barriers to finding meaningful work

This funding will go to organisations working with young people aged 14-24 to help overcome barriers to finding meaningful work. They are looking for approaches that can be tested, evaluated and, where proven to be effective, expanded to more young people.

Two types of grants are available.

- Development Grants -£30,000 – £100,000 pa for delivery and development, for up to 2 years supporting over 50 young people per year.
- Impact Grants - c£100,000 – £800,000 pa for delivery + an independent evaluation paid for separately by Youth Futures, for up to 5 years, supporting over 150 young people per year.

Not-for-profit voluntary or community-sector organisations, or statutory organisations applying individually or as a lead organisation on behalf of a partnership or consortia, which: offer an existing or new solution to youth unemployment and have clearly outlined planned activities, which link to getting young people into work.

Lloyds Bank Foundation are providing immediate funding to charities who have already spent a significant amount of time on their applications, or were expecting to receive new funding. The Resilience and Recovery Loan Fund (RRLF) is a new emergency loan fund which will provide repayable finance to charities and social enterprises who are experiencing disruption as a result of COVID-19 and is intended for such organisations who have an otherwise viable business model. It has been established to make the Government’s existing Coronavirus Business Interruption Loan Scheme (CBILS) more easily accessible to these entities.

The Youth Endowment Fund is aimed at gathering evidence on the effectiveness of existing digital and virtual support activities in reaching vulnerable children and preventing youth crime. The dual aims of this grant round are to help reach and support vulnerable children at risk of youth violence, and to learn the best ways to provide support under the current social distancing and stay-at-home guidelines. The Fund is a £6.5m COVID-19 grant round to fund and evaluate work which supports vulnerable young people at risk of youth violence, and that can be delivered whilst adhering to UK government social distancing and stay-at-home guidelines. The average grant is expected to be around £50,000, with the minimum grant that organisations can apply for is £25,000. There is no maximum, however grants awarded will be proportionate to the turnover of the organisation(s) applying. (50% of the total funding available will be reserved for charities and social enterprises).

The Rugby Football Union has announced a £7m relief package for **community clubs**. The package includes monies ring fenced and diverted for the community game as well as additional funding.

These measures include:

- An early release of £800,000 cash due to clubs through the ticketing fund.
- Early release of final funding payments (£600,000) to Constituent Bodies and suspension of the activity plans against which this was allocated, enabling them to utilise this to provide "**immediate support grants**" to clubs most in need. In addition £400,000 will be made available to Constituent Bodies who elect to match fund from their own reserves.
- A suspension of the Quarterly loan repayments for clubs with outstanding loans due in April (£335,000).
- The creation of a £5m support loans programme, offering loans of between circa £2k and circa £10k to clubs, with deferred re-payments for six months and repayable over three years.

They will be providing more details on this financial package in the coming week. They will also be issuing regular club recovery updates with practical advice on how government grants can be accessed as well as other business management advice.

The Lawn Tennis Association has announced a multi-million pound **support package** for **tennis clubs, coaches and officials**.

The comprehensive package will make additional support available to tennis venues, coaches, officials and players to the value of up to approximately £20m, with the goal of ensuring that tennis in Britain emerges from this period in as strong and healthy a position as possible, and that the sport is able to resume its unique role in keeping the nation active as soon as conditions allow.

The funding and support will aid those who have been most severely affected by the pandemic, many of whom have seen their income streams reduced while still needing to pay bills and support families. The focus is on protecting the grassroots of the sport, but measures have also been put in place to support professional British tennis players and coaches, including financial grants for some lower ranked players who depend on limited tournament prize money to continue in the sport.

Morrisons Foundation - COVID-19 Homeless Support Fund

Based in Bradford, the supermarket chain Morrisons has established the Morrisons Foundation to support local good causes across Great Britain. The Foundation Trustees have pledged support for the Homeless Support Fund, aiming to fund charities caring for the homeless during the coronavirus/COVID-19 outbreak and ensure help gets to those who need it most.

The Foundation recognises that homeless people are particularly vulnerable to COVID-19 because they are more likely to have underlying health conditions and are less able to access basic sanitation. For those who are sleeping rough or are in a crowded night shelter, it is impossible to self-isolate and maintain social distance.

Applicants should:

- Be registered with the Commission/OSCR for a minimum of one year and have filed their documents (i.e. trustee's reports and financial accounts) on time.
- Work directly with homeless people and provide support of one or more of the areas the fund cover.
- Accept payment electronically over the phone (by credit card or BACS).

There is a total of £500,000 for this fund. Awards up to £10,000 are available. However, smaller requests will allow more charities to be supported from the fund. Registered charities who care for the homeless can apply for support to cover the following broad areas:

- Outreach and support for rough sleepers, including provision of essentials.
- Delivery of services in hostels and shelters.
- Information and advice.

The National Lottery Heritage Fund has announced a £50 million fund to support the heritage sector as an immediate response to COVID 19. The fund is available to organisations across the full breadth of heritage.
