D'Oyly Carte Charitable Trust

The D'Oyly Carte Charitable Trust funds registered charities operating in the UK in the fields of the advancement of the arts, health and medical welfare and environmental protection or improvement. The majority of the Trust's grants are single grants over a one-year period. Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund

The Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund, run by the Museums Association, funds projects which develop collections to achieve social impact. Museums, galleries and heritage organisations from across the UK can apply for a grant of between £20,000 and £120,000 for a project lasting up to three years.

Windrush Community Fund - Deadline: 12th February 2021

Grants are available for charities, community or grassroots organisations for projects in the UK which raise awareness of the Windrush Scheme (documentation), the Windrush Compensation Scheme or both. Grants of between £2,500 and £25,000 are available. The funding is intended to support the Fund's objectives which are to:

- Increase awareness and visibility of the Windrush Scheme (documentation), Windrush Compensation Scheme, or both and the support available
- Reach more communities and individuals who may have been affected by their inability to prove their lawful status in the UK

In addition, the Community Fund also seeks to:

- Ensure that individuals and communities have accurate information about the schemes, how to apply, and that any myths surrounding the schemes are addressed. This could involve, for instance, promoting example cases.
- Build capacity at a community and grassroots level to support those affected to access the Windrush Scheme (documentation), Windrush Compensation Scheme, or both.

Volant Charitable Trust – Covid-19 Response Fund - Deadline: 31st July 2021

Derbyshire County Council - COVID-19 Emergency Fund

The Derbyshire County Council (DCC) COVID-19 Emergency Fund aims to support voluntary and community sector organisations with funding to allow them to continue to play a key role in the local response to COVID-19.

Formally constituted organisations can apply for a maximum of £2,000. Non-constituted organisations can apply for a maximum of £250.

Applications are reviewed on a regular basis. No date has been set for closing the fund, but they would recommend that organisations submit their application as soon as possible.

Cameron Grant Memorial Trust - Cameron Grants for Innovation in Mental Health

CGMT will offer 'seed-funding' of between £100 - £2,500, to individuals or organisations who need money to trial innovative ways to support individuals suffering with poor mental health.

The grant can be used to trial a new service, create an asset, a technology, a performance, fund research, or otherwise experiment in any way that supports the treatment mental health. The emphasis will be on innovation – using new methods, channels, technology, ideas or approaches to reach out and effect change. Ideas should typically fit into one of the following categories:

- Destigmatising Mental Health
- Reducing Barriers to Mental Health Care
- Improving Mental Well Being

Masonic Charitable Foundation - Deadline: 31st March 2021

The Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) offers grants to local and national charities in England and Wales as part of its work to help thousands of disadvantaged and vulnerable people to live happy, fulfilling lives and participate actively in society.

Depending on their annual income level, charities can apply for either a:

- Large grant, which is for projects and can be used for salary costs, activities, materials, etc., or
- Small grant, which is for general running and/or overhead costs of the charity – core funding.

Children and Young People Grants Programme

Grants for charities in England and Wales that support disadvantaged and vulnerable children and young people (up the age of 25 years) to overcome the barriers they face in order to achieve the best possible start in life. The Early Years Opportunities Grants programme offers both small and large grants to registered charities in England and Wales to create the best start in life for disadvantaged children and young people.

Later Life Inclusion Grants Programme

The Reducing Isolation in Later Life Grants programme offers both small and large grants to registered charities that support disadvantaged and vulnerable older people over 50 years of age in England and Wales. Over the next five years, the MCF will be supporting charities that help people to overcome barriers to actively participate in society in their later years.

Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust - Deadline: 28th February 2021

Grants are available to UK registered charities for projects that address specific categories set out by the Trust each year. The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust offers funding to UK registered charities whose work takes place in the UK and directly supports the theme selected by the Trustees for that year. Applications will be accepted from 1 February 2021 to 28 February 2021. This round will fund projects support people who are homeless with priority given to applications that help BAME communities.

National Lottery Heritage Fund Announces Round 2 of Culture Recovery Fund

The Heritage Fund will be awarding a total of £36 million in grants ranging from £10,000 to £3 million. The funding aims to help heritage organisations recover, reopen and remain resilient as the country emerges from lockdown in 2021.

The funding is to be used to cover the period from 1 April 2021 to 31 June 2021 only.

The funding can cover any costs associated with shortfalls in income during the April to June period whilst working towards restarting normal operations or business. This shortfall may be costs incurred as part of operations and business, including staffing, overheads, marketing, heritage activities, and maintenance of buildings and land, equipment and services.

In addition to ongoing costs, there may be additional “one-off” costs associated with restarting and these costs can include:

- Rehiring or recruiting staff
- Contracting freelancers
- Purchasing or installing essential COVID-19 related equipment, and stabilising heritage that is at immediate risk, for example, scaffolding or urgent minor conservation work (up to a maximum of 20% of the amount applied for)
- Repaying or clearing COVID-19 related debt incurred since 1 October 2020.

Allen Lane Social Cohesion Programme

- To proactively work towards building better community cohesion and trust, and encouraging respect and understanding in the local area
- To proactively promote the inclusion of marginalised groups and individuals in the life of the local community
- To fund work which breaks down barriers and tensions in the local community thereby reducing feelings of division and "them and us".

The Foundation is seeking applications from community-led grassroots groups and organisations which have a focus of work being at a very local/community level, which could be a housing estate or distinct community.

Applications will be particularly encouraged from areas of high deprivation but not exclusively. The Foundation is keen to support communities come up with their own solutions to local issues of division.

They are open to supporting actions which are new or may have been tried before or are on-going, however, the work must have lasting benefits for those people the projects are aimed at.

KFC Foundation Community Grants Programme - Deadline: 28th February 2021

Grants are available to support grassroots organisations providing safe social spaces, mentoring, work, or social skills for young people aged 11 to 25 years old in the UK. Grants of between £200 and £2,000 are available. The funding is intended for projects and activities which:

- Benefit young people aged 11-25 years old.
- Support those in a position of social disadvantage (i.e. care leavers, those experiencing homelessness, young carers, young parents, young people at risk of or with experience of the criminal justice system).
- Provide spaces that allow young people to feel safe and secure, helping to unlock talent and build life skills, provide mentoring, and improve their chances of gaining meaningful employment.
- Ultimately empower all young people to fulfil their potential and build a positive future.
- Will demonstrate positive results within 12 months of the receipt of funding.

We run this fund in that spirit of imagination, potential impact and fun.

The fund is currently open to new applications:

- That are based on a technical idea or innovation.
- That could deliver a social or environmental benefit.
- That are intriguing, inventive and have an element of fun.

The Finnis Scott Foundation: Art & Horticultural Fund

The Finnis Scott Foundation make grants for any charitable purpose, but their present policy is to focus grant-making in the areas of horticulture and plant sciences, as well as fine art and art history. The Trustees only consider applications for grants up to £10,000. Exceptionally, larger grants may be considered at the Trustees’ discretion. Preference is given to smaller charities where a grant would have a significant impact.

The Foundation funds both capital and revenue projects. Requests for salaries will not be considered, except in the case of educational support (bursaries and apprenticeships). Grants are not given for expenditure which has already been made. The Trustees next meet in January but no specific deadline for submissions has been issued.

Comic Relief - Tech for Good Build 2021 - Deadline: Noon on 12th February 2021

Youth Covid-19 Support Fund

The Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport has announced an emergency funding package to protect the immediate future of grassroots and national youth organisations. £16.5 million will be available through the Youth Covid-19 Support Fund for grassroots youth clubs, uniformed youth groups, and national youth and umbrella organisations across the UK to help mitigate the impact of lost income during the winter period due to the coronavirus pandemic, and ensure services providing vital support can remain open. The funding will be allocated from the government's £750 million package of support, of which more than £60 million has already been provided to organisations working with vulnerable children and young people. Further details, including eligibility and how to apply, are due to be announced soon.

- You can apply for a Main Grant or a Small Grant but not both.
- Applications can be submitted to continue existing Main or Small Grants or to fund new work

MSE Charity's 'Raising the Next Generation' Theme Opens for Applications - 26th February 2021

The Money Saving Expert (MSE) Charity is currently accepting UK applications but will close as soon as 40 applications are accepted, so groups need to be quick in submitting their application. The MSE Charity is funded by Money Saving Expert and gives grants to not for profit organisations that deliver activities which make a lasting impact on how people think, behave and manage their money. The maximum grant is £7,500. Rank Foundation

New £10m programme, with £5m from government's Community Match Challenge. Funds up to 200 small and medium sized charities/social enterprises, primarily those in the RankNet network. Organisations must be in urgent and immediate financial need and either be facing unprecedented demand for their services or a significant reduction in income due to the pandemic. www.rankfoundation.com

Sylvia Waddilove Foundation

Small to medium organisations struggling to manage the financial impact of COVID. The fund is targeted at organisations in a critical position: education relating to non-domestic animals; visual and performing arts; medical research; the relief of disability or severe illness; the accommodation of those in need. Paul Hamlyn Foundation

Paul Hamlyn Foundation has created a £20m Emergency Fund, in addition to the £30m already allocated to grant-making programmes for 2020/2021. The Fund addresses inequalities of opportunity to access and participate in the arts. Grants from £30,000 - £400,000 and lasting between 12 months and 4 years

Deadline - rolling application cycle - no deadlines. Decision making panels meet approximately 5 times a year.

The Severn Trent Community Fund

The Severn Trent Community Fund is open to non-COVID 19 related projects and they are seeing a huge increase in demand for funding. So that they can support as many projects as possible, they are reducing the range of their largest funding pot to £75,000 - £200,000 (previously £75,000 – £250,000). Any applications applying for over £75,000 must be able to demonstrate a considerable link to ALL THREE of their wellbeing themes: People, Place and Environment.

National Lottery Community Fund

The Local Connections Fund is a new £4 million fund to help charities and community groups in England that are working to reduce loneliness by helping them build connections across their communities.

The Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport (DCMS) and The National Lottery Community Fund are investing £2 million each.

This will be used to fund hundreds of 'microgrants' between £300 and £2,500, so small, local organisations (with an annual income of £50,000 or less) can bring people and communities together.

Two rounds of funding

The Local Connections Fund will be split into two equal rounds of funding. DCMS will provide the first £2 million round of funding - which will be distributed by The National Lottery Community Fund. This first round will be open for applications on 5 January 2021 and close on 26 January 2021.

Successful applicants for this round of funding must have spent the money and finished their project by 31 March 2021.

The second round of funding will be provided by The National Lottery Community Fund and will launch in the summer of 2021. If you've received funding in the first round, you will not be eligible for funding in the second round.

Grants from the first round of funding will strengthen and develop small and micro organisations that connect communities together and reduce loneliness.

So if your group or organisation helps people at higher risk of mental ill health meet one of more of the following 'Five Ways to Wellbeing' then you may consider applying for a grant: You do not have to meet all five, but you do need to meet AT LEAST one of the Five Ways to Wellbeing.

Where possible, design your project / activity to include all 5 elements of the Five Ways to Wellbeing. For example a 'walking group' could include all elements of the Five Ways in the following ways:

- Connect - ensuring the group is inclusive and has social elements like coffee breaks.
- Be Active – different levels of walks depending on ability i.e. beginners or advanced.
- Take Notice – themed walks such as nature trails and photography walks.
- Keep Learning – heritage trails, walk leader course.
- Give – providing support, advice, and encouragement to other members of the group

The Youth Endowment Fund is aimed at gathering evidence on the effectiveness of existing digital and virtual support activities in reaching vulnerable children and preventing youth crime. The dual aims of this grant round are to help reach and support vulnerable children at risk of youth violence, and to learn the best ways to provide support under the current social distancing and stay-at-home guidelines. The Fund is a £6.5m COVID-19 grant round to fund and evaluate work which supports vulnerable young people at risk of youth violence, and that can be delivered whilst adhering to UK government social distancing and stay-at-home guidelines. The average grant is expected to be around £50,000, with the minimum grant that organisations can apply for is £25,000. There is no maximum, however grants awarded will be proportionate to the turnover of the organisation(s) applying. (50% of the total funding available will be reserved for charities and social enterprises).
